## LWV CVA 2020-21 Program Planning

Free Virtual Meeting: Sunday, December 6, 2020 – 2-4pm

What is "Program Planning"? Program Planning happens annually at the local League level. It is the time when we consider the positions taken by our League on the local and state or national levels. Our positions give the League a voice and are the result of an established process: the LWV takes action on an issue or advocates for a cause when there is an existing League position that supports the issue or speaks to the cause. Without a position, League action/advocacy cannot be taken. This is what your League of Women Voters is all about and Program Planning is your opportunity to weigh in.

For 2021, we will study **Local** and **State League positions** in preparation for our May 3, 2021 *LWV CVA Annual Meeting* as well as the June 5 LWV-VA convention. Do we wish to retain current positions, to act on them, and/or to begin new studies with the goal of establishing consensus and positions for action on other issues? As part of this review, we will hear from committee members who will be suggesting updating current local program "Action" statements. Our recommendations from this meeting will be presented to our members for approval at the Annual Meeting in May.

To prepare for our 2020 meeting, check out our Local Program: Positioned for Action as described in the LWV CVA 2020-2021 Membership Handbook. On pages 15 -21, you will find "Action" items on: Government, Natural Resources, and Social Policy. (These positions can also be found on our website: <a href="https://www.cva.org">lwv-cva.org</a> under the pull-down menu, "Explore the League" – Advocacy, then click on "Local.") Carol recommends that you read the Program section (pages 15-21) of the LWV CVA 2020-21 Membership Handbook before you come to the meeting—meeting time is short, there are many decisions to be made, and your advance preparation will make a real difference! <u>Current Action Statement as found in LWV CVA 2020-21 Handbook (page 20):</u>

### Health and Family Life Education and Health Services in Area Public Schools:

Action: Support of the following health services and programs: a dedicated health facility which conforms to state and national guidelines; a full time health professional for each school health facility; school advisory boards which include health professionals, parents, and community members; a qualified and trained director of school health programs; and health and family life education in our area schools which includes: regular periodic review of curriculum to ensure updating with new information or materials and to meet needs that are identified, more age-appropriate comprehensive sexuality education, continued training of teachers in health and family life curricula and issues, use of experts to participate in health and family life education of students and teacher training, identifying additional resource materials and making them available to students, parents and teachers, increasing community and family understanding of and involvement in health and family life education. ### Education

Action:

Support of specified statements to assure quality education, particularly addressing the needs of diverse student populations in the Charlottesville Area school systems, including the City of Charlottesville, Albemarle County, and Fluvanna County.

Support for local policies that promote learning by recognizing that the basic needs of all children include health care and adequate nutrition.

Support for local policies that promote learning by recognizing the basic needs of all children include mental and physical health and adequate nutrition. (2019)

Support and funding for pre-kindergarten programs and full-day kindergarten programs for all students.

Support for curriculum and programs that prepare students for a 21st century workforce by providing emphasis on scientific, technological, engineering, and mathematical skills.

Support for curriculum and programs that prepare students for a 21st century workforce by providing emphasis on scientific, technological, engineering, and mathematical skills that correlate with critical thinking, and the cyber age.

Support for increase in internet access and cyber education. This includes teaching about artificial intelligence and how to be discriminating readers and listeners in dealing with media as early as first grade. Support all aspects of community education, including teaching about gun safety, violence prevention, and protection. (2019)

Support of all aspects of community education. Support of specific ways to attract and retain quality classroom teachers and to encourage excellence in teaching. Continued monitoring of local school systems, with special emphasis on expenditures and funding sources, education and extracurricular programs, salaries and responsibilities, and citizen involvement. ### President's Message

Dear Leaguers, The following letter appeared in *The Daily Progress* (November 28, 2020) -

Numbers tell only part of the story, good as they are. Almost 80% of Albemarle County's registered voters cast ballots and 70% of Charlottesville's. Behind those numbers, including the unprecedented early-voting numbers (67% and 74% of votes cast, respectively) there were hundreds of volunteers, staff, and officials working to make the process run smoothly.

The League of Women Voters of the Charlottesville Area thanks everyone who created this community success story. Specifically, we appreciate the Boards of Elections, the Registrars, the chief of each precinct, and the official election workers, full and part-time, who worked tirelessly all day and for days or weeks ahead of time.

But there are other examples of individuals' devotion to the goal of getting a clear record of each person's vote. Unnoticed were all the County employees who agreed to work at home, freeing the 5th Street County Office Building parking lot for early voters.

We noticed many cases in City and County of devotion to the job. For example, the mobility-challenged poll worker who painfully rose from her chair to check each time an "id" was hard to read through the plexiglass. There were dozens of lawyers who took extra training and volunteered to spend Election Day and the counting days to watch for any irregularities. And the Charlottesville Clergy Collective was ready to diffuse any disruptions.

Cheerful partisans greeted voters of all persuasions, often making the entrance to their polling place festive and welcoming. Finally, we thank the Voters who put in the effort to cast their ballots, sometimes standing in a long line. The glee of first-time voters, who get applause, is always delightful to see.

The community effort behind the record-breaking numbers shows our democracy is working and gives us hope for its future.

## New Action Plan Drives 2021 Justice Reform Committee by Kit Murphy McNally, LWV CVA Justice Reform Committee Chair

The Justice Reform Committee will launch 2021 with increased self-education and action guided by *Transforming the System: Front End Criminal Justice Reform*, a plan designed by member Traci Griggs. Focusing on women entangled with the local and state justice system, the committee intends to further assess the extent to which women in conflict with the law benefit from existing alternatives to incarceration in the five counties served by LWV CVA. Data reported by Criminal Justice Planner Neal Goodloe at a LWV Sunday Seminar in April serves as a strong driver in this quest. His presentation can be viewed at <a href="https://www.cva.org">www-cva.org</a> by clicking on the drop-down menu "Explore the League" and then clicking Justice Reform Committee.

Committee members will also consider any local impact on women relating to justice reform legislation recently adopted in the Virginia General Assembly special session. More action on justice reform may be considered during the brief General Assembly session in January.

Self-education and research are the driving factors for the committee in 2021 with a goal toward action deemed most beneficial to local jurisdictions. Additionally, the committee will draw from knowledge of programs and action underway within other LWV groups around the state. The LWV-VA justice groups are variously focusing on restorative justice, civil rights, race and equity, women's rights in the justice system, death penalty abolishment, diversion, sentencing, school to prison pipeline, juvenile justice, felons right to vote, elimination of cash bail, prosecutorial discretion and (LWV-CVA) community alternatives to incarceration. The state justice groups plan to connect monthly in 2021.

Beginning in January 2021, the Justice Reform Committee will meet the second Tuesday of every month at 10 am via Zoom. There will be no meeting in December. There's plenty of room for new members/advocates. If interested, contact Kit Murphy McNally murphymcnally@gmail.com.

### LWV CVA Child Care Committee Report by Beth Kariel

On November 16, Charlottesville City Council voted to no longer require a Special Use Permit for Licensed Family Day Homes, where 5-12 children are cared for. A Provisional Use Permit will be required. (The details of this update come close to what Albemarle County currently allows.)

This will make it easier to start Family Day Homes in the City of Charlottesville.

While the pandemic probably pushed this issue to the forefront, the Child Care Committee is aware that some citizens had already advocated for this change, prior to the pandemic.

While doing our recent study, the LWV CVA Child Care Committee did find that the most deaths occur in home child care settings. And, while safety is a primary concern of ours, we do recognize the pros and cons of home child care versus licensed center care.

### LWV CVA Natural Resources Committee Report by Muriel Grim

The Natural Resources committee virtual meeting was held on November 24. We scheduled the next NRC meeting for Tuesday, December 22 at 1 pm but will change that if necessary.

The November Comp Plan Study Group meeting will be on Monday, November 30 at 3 pm. Charlottesville Historic Preservation and Design Planner, Jeff Werner, will be our presenter for Chapter 5, *Historic, Cultural, and Scenic Resources*.

Local Program Planning: We decided that our current Natural Resources program does cover advocacy that we might consider on behalf of Environmental Justice issues. At the Program Planning meeting (December 6 at 2 pm) we will bring up the possibility of making an umbrella statement about social justice in the Social Policy section of LWV-CVA program.

We discussed Land Use issues in the Charlottesville League's area such as the water intake and pump station on Rassawek, the historic capital of the Monacan Indian Nation, and the unusually early interest in seeking an extension of the North Anna power plant operating license. This led to considering how we might get League members from all of the Thomas Jefferson Planning District to participate in NRC activities. We would like to invite someone from the Thomas Jefferson Planning District to speak to the committee. We will post an announcement in the newsletter inviting members from all of our Local League counties to join us.

We also will monitor some local development plans such as Breezy Hill off Route 250 east of Charlottesville and the RST development on Route 29 near Forest Lakes.

From Associated Press [as published in The Daily Progress] November 28:

RICHMOND — Applications will open Monday [November 30] for citizens who want to serve on Virginia's newly created bipartisan redistricting commission, a group that will redraw the state's congressional and General Assembly districts to conform with the 2020 Census.

The 16-member panel, which was created after <u>voters approved a</u> <u>constitutional amendment</u> earlier this month, will include eight legislators and eight regular citizens, evenly divided between Democrats and Republicans. The eight citizens will be chosen by retired judges from a list prepared by legislators.

The judges **met Wednesday** to discuss and approve the detailed citizen applications, which include questions about a person's education, employment history, political party affiliation, age, household income, voting history, leadership experience and any "partisan activities or relevant employment history" of their relatives.

The judges also voted to require that applicants submit three recommendations.

The applications will be made available at **redistricting.dls.virginia.gov**, and applications will be accepted for four weeks. When that window closes, staff at the state Division of Legislative Services will evaluate the applications and provide legislative leaders with a pool of applications that are eligible and complete.

### **LWV CVA Electoral Board Observer Corps Report**

Louisa County Electoral Board Meeting (call-in attendance) November 23, 2020 10:00 - 1130 AM

The Electoral Board members and County Registrar were in virtual attendance.

Re November early and day-of voting:

There have been good reviews from the public regarding the early voting for the November 2020 elections.

### Registrar's report:

- They used several methods of advertising and explaining the early voting dates/location/times.
- 8200 people voted early in-person
- 4300 mail-in ballots were provided
- Turnout was 80.6% of registered voters
- 53% voted early
- There was a net increase of 1,950 new voters registered
- There were 120 officers of election and 6 training sessions (4 in person and virtual and 2 inperson only)
- There were 15-20 ballots deposited at the box at the Registrar's Office each day
- A number of Chiefs appointed, and provided training, for one specific person to oversee the provisional ballots
- There will be additional work done on updating training for officials as all of the changes of 2020 will remain.
- There was a candidates forum set up by the Registrar's Office in 2019, and they are proposing to do that again for the 2021 elections.
- There was discussion about requesting input from the Party Chairs re how the election process worked. Also discussion regarding thank you notes to the Chiefs and Assistant Chiefs with a request for their input as well. The input will be officially collected in January or February of 2011.
- It was noted that redistricting will be an issue re: precinct changes and polling places.
- Security policies and risk procedure will be reviewed and revised due to the changes is electoral processes.

### Secretary's Report

- 1 new tablet was obtained with CARES funds. In December they will look to review all kinds
  of electronic poll books and decide which they wish to obtain. New training will be developed
  for the new equipment.
- There are 2 full-time people working with Chris in the registrar's office. There was discussion about hiring 1 more full-time person. Chris suggested hiring someone to work 3 days/wk and someone to be hired, specifically, to help with the 45 days of early voting.

### Additional Discussion

- There will be no Electoral Board meeting in December
- The next meeting will be January 11, 2021 at 10:00 AM.

### International Relations / Federal Government Committee News by Gerry Kruger

The virtual November 18, 2020, International Relations/Federal Government Committee meeting was extremely informative, thanks to our presenters, **Susan Roberts** and **Natalie Testa**. (Coincidentally, our own **Susan D. Roberts, an LWV CVA member**, presented a report at our October meeting.)

**Susan Roberts**, who spoke at our November meeting, is a member of the United Nations Association chapter in Charlottesville. Approximately 200 such chapters exist. She explained the numerous agencies of the United Nations, which many of our members hadn't realized were part of the UN. The World Health Organization (WHO), from which President Trump withdrew the United States after the Covid-19 outbreak in China came to the US, is one of these agencies.

The goals of the United Nations are very much in line with those of the League of Women Voters. Health care, peace and justice, clean energy, quality education, and reduced inequality are a few of these. Recently the UN proclaimed November 2 as the "International Day to End Impunity for Crimes against Journalists."

The Security Council establishes peacekeeping operations and also governs the largest military force in the world. Now they offer training to prevent sexual abuse, since it's a problem in peacekeeping missions. The Model UN is an extra-curricular activity for high school and college students. These students typically roleplay delegates to the United Nations and simulate UN committees. Recently a multigenerational model has been created which includes the very young to the oldest. Funding for the UN amounted to 8.6 billion dollars in 2019. The US owed 1/3 of that. However, even before President Trump was president, the US debt to the UN has been in arrears.

Natalie Testa proved that there is much our media doesn't cover when it comes to world events. Few of us had heard of the bloodiest riots ever that came about due to the metro fee being raised 30 pesos (four cents) in Santiago, Chile. Rioters have destroyed historical buildings and metro stations, and the burning and violence have expanded to other cities. Police aimed rubber bullets at eyes and caused many protesters to lose their sight. Many have died and thousands have been injured or imprisoned. Chile is a democracy with one of the worst income gaps between the rich and poor. The ruling class makes the laws, which always favor the rich.

As a result of the riots, an election offering a referendum on writing a new constitution took place. 80% turned out for it and no one voted against it. The referendum asked Chileans if they wanted a new constitution and what kind of body they would want to draw it up. Citizens who voted want to see the lower classes involved in the writing as well as gender equity and diversity. They hope labor unions and teachers unions will be participate.

Natalie also gave us an update on the leader of Myanmar, Aung San Suu Kyi, an icon who fell from grace after receiving the Nobel Peace Prize in 1991. She spent 15 years in detention for trying to bring democracy to the military-ruled Myanmar (also known as Burma). Although San Suu Kyi is now the leader of her country, the generals still have the final say. They have gone back to the ethnic cleansing of the Rohingya population. She is accused of doing nothing to stop rape, murder and possible genocide by refusing to condemn the still powerful military or acknowledge accounts of atrocities, saying reports of these are fake news. Even though she has been a political prisoner, she refuses to free political prisoners. Natalie promises to keep us informed about this matter.
