International Relations/Federal Gov't Report By Gerry Kruger

On October 18, the International Relations/ Federal Government Committee enjoyed an outstanding report about India. Due to a Fulbright scholarship, which she received in 1981, Anita Pilling lived in India for a year. Diane Skalak, Carol Cutler, Susan Roberts, Rosalie Simari, Jean Minehart, Miriam Fleitiman, Rice Wagner, and Gerry Kruger were treated to Anita's firsthand stories of India's long and arduous history and current circumstances.

Anita's report included tales of tribes that invaded India as early as 2600 BCE. India's rich, natural resources were a magnet for invaders, seeking power and riches. Europeans, especially the French and British, desired their spices, silks, and great wealth. As different groups invaded India, they brought different religions and cultures. This created more divisions in its population. Of all the invaders, Great Britain did the most harm, destroying the textile industry, controlling which crops could be grown, and what could be exported. Under their rule there was widespread starvation, and they exacerbated the caste system and sectarian strife because they pitted the various groups against each other. There has always been friction among diverse groups in India.

In 1947 India gained independence with Nehru as its first Prime Minister. Education, religious tolerance, women's rights, and socialism prevailed for years. Nevertheless, the United States supported Pakistan and ignored India. As a result, India turned to Russia for weapons. Prime Minister

Narendra Modi is expected to be elected again shortly. Modi's party is the Hindu Nationalist Party or the BJP. Under Modi, India has become world's fifth biggest economy, but there is a sharp contrast between the northern part of India and the South. Those in the South are richer, better educated, healthier, and more respectful of women. Modi appears to be widening the country's regional divides. The United States hopes to wean India off Russian weapons and provide them with military support. As China has become more dominant, the US wants an Asian partner. India sees American ties as economic opportunities.

Join us as we continue to study and discuss international issues and events. Anita highly recommends reading *My Promised Land* by Ari Sharvit as an excellent source of factual information on Israel, which is sure to be a topic of discussion in the near future. **Our next meeting is Wednesday, November 15 - noon to 2 pm at Northside Library.
